Dr. Jonathan Cools-Lartigue is testing a new strategy to stop metastasis that examines what makes a person's immune system blind to cancer cells and allows a tumour to grow. Thanks to philanthropic support, the first phase of his project was fully funded this year! Showcasing the impact of donor support, these funds were used to support the hiring of a post-doctoral researcher and enable Dr. Cools-Lartigue to further this important work.




Together Against Cancer
Equalizing Access to
Life-Saving Clinical Trials

Dr. Jonathan Spicer aims to provide thoracic cancer patients throughout the province with equitable access to clinical trials — even those who live far from big-city teaching hospitals. Thanks to your support, this year Dr. Spicer increased access to clinical trials by hiring clinical research coordinators in two new regions of the province. The goal is to expand this initiative to hospitals in other regions. Dr. Spicer was also among the investigators of a groundbreaking worldwide study that successfully paired immunotherapy with chemotherapy before and after surgery resulting in a higher rate of overall survival for lung cancer patients with resectable disease.

Together Against Cancer
Soirée en or Raised \$500,000

The tropics came to the Four Seasons hotel on December 5, 2024, for Soirée en or, which raised nearly \$500,000 to support transformative research projects in thoracic cancers. Co-chaired by Heidi Hollinger and Dominic Costantini, our fundraiser supports cancer research of the MUHC's Division of Thoracic Surgery. Led by Dr. Lorenzo Ferri at the MGH, the department is

renowned for treating complex cancers of patients referred from more than 42 hospitals across the province. In the lab, Dr. Ferri and his team are developing personalized, precision treatments. Dr. Ferri's pan-cancer, pan-Canadian Precision Oncology Platform is a major initiative to develop these personalized treatments, also supported by our Together Against Cancer campaign.

"Surgical results continue to improve because of less invasive techniques, but to keep up, we require new robotic equipment, new people with these skills, new approaches to training, and visionary research programs."

Thanks to MGHF support, Dr. Liane Feldman's ambitious Future of Surgery initiative is transforming surgery through innovative projects to make surgery safer, less invasive, and more precise — with shorter recovery times and better patient outcomes.

This year, the initiative has advanced in several ways, including using remote monitoring soft-

ware to shorten post-surgical hospital stays and acquiring next-generation equipment to help doctors save more lives.

A promising area this year has been integrating technologies such as robotics and AI, which are transforming the surgical experience and contributing to better outcomes before, during, and after surgery.

"We're working on surgical robotics to do very complex surgical cuts for cancer treatment. This year I used augmented reality in the operating room. The possibilities are endless."

Here are a few projects made possible with your generosity through the Future of Surgery initiative.

A SuPER New Home!

The Surgical Performance Enhancement and Robotics (SuPER) Centre moved into its new home within the Dr. Phil Gold Pavilion of the Research Institute of the McGill University Health Centre (The Institute) at the MGH. Directed by Amir Hooshier, PhD, this futuristic research hub is bringing robotics and AI to many medical disciplines — from orthopedic, abdominal, head and neck, eye, maxillofacial, and spinal surgery to interventional cardiology and radiology — reimagining and redesigning medical procedures to make them less invasive, more personalized, safer, and more effective.

Remote Monitoring for Smooth Recovery

To reduce hospital stays and improve patient experience, your generosity supported a virtual patient interface so surgery patients can go home sooner. Led by Dr. Larry Lee at the MGH, the post-discharge remote monitoring project was piloted with bariatric, thoracic, colorectal, and joint replacement surgeries. Thanks to its effectiveness, this solution is now being rolled out to surgical departments across the MUHC.

New Technology to Save Lives

Your support purchased a Medtronic StealthStation S8 neuro navigation unit for the MGH Intensive Care Unit, so neurosurgeons can quickly and non-invasively map out a life-saving procedure called a ventricular drain (EVD). The result? This new equipment helps neurosurgeons optimally perform this procedure every time, therefore reducing the risk of new brain injuries and improving outcomes for traumatic brain injury patients.

“It’s my role as a neurosurgeon to measure the pressure in the brain and treat it when it is too high. Making space for the brain to heal is vital. This neuro navigation unit helps us do that with more precision than ever and can mean higher chances of recovery for patients.”

Bringing AI to Surgery

The Future of Surgery initiative is now benefiting from using a revolutionary new platform called Theator. This technology allows surgeons to more easily record and review operations and applies AI analytics for educational and improvement purposes. This data is an incredible resource for training, quality improvement and research, and is already being used to review and improve surgical techniques, train and coach residents, and in research projects. A major step forward for excellence in care, thanks to you!



Thanks to your support, surgeons at the MGH were among the first in North America to start using Theator.



“We’re trying to figure out the immune landscape in the uterus at the time the embryo wants to implant. What is different between patients that have normal fertility and patients that are infertile or miscarry? The eventual goal of this research is to have a blood test to diagnose and treat an immune problem before patients have recurrent miscarriages or repeated in-vitro fertilization failures.”

* SOIRÉE IMPACT & INNOVATION EVENING


Approximately half our Foundation's funding goes to research and innovation! This year, we invested \$9.1 million in research, amounting to 51% of our philanthropic support.

Showcasing the impact of this support, visionary researchers, generous philanthropists, and medical leaders filled Montreal's Maison Alcan

on October 23, 2024, for the MGHF's inaugural Impact & Innovation Evening.

This event also celebrated the 67 recipients of this year's MGHF Research Awards. Thanks to our donors, award recipients collectively benefited from \$2M in funding, advancing projects ranging from personalized cancer care to brain and mental health, medicine, surgery, healthy living, and more. In addition, the evening featured health-tech startups supported by our Impact Investment Program, a partnership with the Clinical Innovation Platform (CLIP) — a unique incubator at the heart of the MGH and The Institute.

Accelerating Healthcare Innovation, One Investment at a Time

On July 25, 2024, donors, doctors, investors, researchers, entrepreneurs, and guests gathered at the CLIP to hear pitches from six health-tech startups. Selected from more than 20 applicants, these startups were vying for funding through the MGHF's Impact Investment Program.

Supporting the next generation of innovation.

This unique program offers convertible loans for startups wanting to scale their healthcare innovations to the benefit of patients in Quebec and Canada.

Since successfully pitching at this event, **Juno Technologies** (developing a wearable device to relieve menstrual pain) and **Ora Medical** (creating innovative remote rehabilitation solutions) received funding through our program.

This year, we also granted impact investment

funding to two other startups, selected for the program in 2023:

- **AFX Medical** is an AI-assisted, neuro-oncology software company.
- **Hepius Medical** is developing smart cardiac catheter technology to assist surgeons in delivering effective ablation therapy.

Collaboration and Open Science: Building the Psychiatry of Tomorrow

Our Foundation is pleased to support the Centre for Precision Psychiatry - Quebec (CPP-Q), whose new open-source biobank project, Solutions for Psychiatric AI Research & Knowledge (SPARK) shared its first data release this year. Founded and led by neuropsychiatrist Dr. Simon Ducharme, the CPP-Q aims to improve the diagnosis and treatment of mental health disorders by advancing precision psychiatry and research.

SPARK's goal is to gather clinical, biological, and neuroimaging data of 1,000 psychiatry patients, mainly from the MUHC Mental Health Mission, who will be followed for 10 years. In addition to working at the MUHC, Dr. Ducharme is now

collaborating with the Douglas Mental Health University Institute to recruit patients for the biobank. The CPP-Q uses infrastructure at The Institute to process, store, and analyze data and biological samples, and the MGH MRI Research Platform for neuroimaging, a core service of The Institute.

Honouring an Icon: The New Dr. Phil Gold Pavilion

What's in a name? Plenty, in the case of Dr. Phil Gold. Last June, in collaboration with The Institute, we announced the naming of the pavilion that houses The Institute at the MGH: **the Dr. Phil Gold Pavilion.**

In his 60-year career at the MGH, the incomparable Dr. Gold made an incredible impact on countless patients, clinicians, and researchers. A collaborator, friend, and mentor of the Foundation and many medical leaders we support, Dr. Gold is a renowned clinician-scientist who, in 1965, along with Dr. Samuel Freedman, discovered the first biomarker for cancer. (In fact, in the 1970s, the pavilion that now bears Dr. Gold's name was first built using funds he donated from the sale of this blood test to detect cancer.)

"The Dr. Phil Gold Pavilion will stand as a testament to his legacy of discovery, innovation, and care. Dr. Gold is not only a brilliant researcher and an exceptional leader, but above all, an unmatched mentor. Everyone he has trained can attest to this, and that's why his name truly belongs on this building."



Thanks to your generosity, we raised over **\$20M** in total gifts this fiscal year. Thank you!


